ALPACAS. EAST SUS

Walk alongside the alpacas of Spring Farm near Fletching in East Sussex, through 110 acres of undulating fields, followed by a carrot-feeding and selfie session. During the two hours you spend with them, you will hear all about the alpacas, their history and how their fleeces come in 22 different colours. The alpacas are friendly, halter-trained and even know their own names! There is a maximum of 10 alpacas on each walk, and children must be over 12 years old to walk one on their own. Those aged eight to 12 can join, accompanied by an adult.

RCULAR, YORKSI

The lush, green Wharfedale valley in the Yorkshire Dales is home to the market town of Grassington, from where there are many delightful walks

along the banks of the River Wharfe to picturesque nearby villages including Conistone, Kilnsey and Hebden. The surrounding landscape is punctuated by rocky limestone outcrops and nearby waterfalls, including Linton Falls, Scar Lash and the Strid at Bolton

Abbey. A family-friendly 3.5-mile circular walk from Grassington passes through Grass Wood Nature Reserve, before dropping down to the River Wharfe and back into town via Ghaistrill's Strid and a 17th-century road bridge.

EST. EAST SUSSED

Ashdown Forest in East Sussex was the inspiration for Winnie the Pooh's Hundred Acre Wood. There are now two "Pooh Walks" taking in the sites of some of Pooh's adventures. The shorter walk takes in the Enchanted Place and the Sandy Pit, and is suitable for younger children; while the longer walk includes the North Pole and Eevore's Gloomy Place. Ashdown Forest is the largest open-access space in the South East, nearly two-thirds of it heathland, and one of the rarest habitats in Britain.

Since its invention nearly 20 years ago in the US, geocaching has become increasingly popular and is a great way to involve the whole family in an outdoor treasure hunt. Using a GPS-enabled device (a mobile phone is fine), the objective is to find hidden "caches", small waterproof containers with a logbook inside and often an item of "treasure" that may then be replaced with another. You sign and date the logbook and register your discovery online. The sport is a great way of exploring new destinations, as well as rediscovering your local area with new eyes.
